A public **Mass of Reconciliation will be celebrated at St. Joseph's Basilica** by Archbishop Smith on Thursday, September 30, 2021 at 7pm. This Mass will be livestreamed by the Archdiocese communication office.

We pray for all Canadians. May we open our minds and hearts to the truth that is unfolding regarding the treatment and deaths of children in residential schools. We pray to the Lord.

Let us embrace the spirit of this new national holiday and truly live our way into new relationships of truth, reconciliation, love and respect.

Therese of the Child Jesus

(Feast day October 1)

At the age of 14, on Christmas Eve in 1886, Therese had a conversion that transformed her life. From then on, her powerful energy and sensitive spirit were turned toward love, instead of keeping herself happy. At 15, she entered the Carmelite convent in Lisieux to give her whole life to God. She took the religious name Sister Therese of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face. After a long struggle with tuberculosis, she died on September 30, 1897, at the age of 24.

The world came to know Therese through her autobiography, "Story of a Soul". She described her life as a "little way of spiritual childhood. "What matters in life," she wrote, "is not great deeds, but great love." Therese believed in doing the ordinary, with extraordinary love.

She loved flowers and saw herself as the "little flower of Jesus," who gave glory to God by just being her beautiful little self among all the other flowers in God's garden.

Her inspiration and powerful presence from heaven touched many people very quickly. She was canonized by Pope Pius XI on May 17, 1925. Had she lived, she would have been only 52 years old when she was declared a Saint.

"My mission - to make God loved - will begin after my death. I will spend my heaven doing good on earth. I will let fall a shower of roses." Countless millions have been touched by her intercession and imitate her "little way." She has been acclaimed "the greatest saint of modern times."


